Census Enumerators listed names and dates as they understood the registrant who oft times had little or no education which led to numerous errors in names, dates and ages. I have tried to copy the census as recorded, where errors occur, I apologize. Death certificates are not available in Spartanburg for years before 1917 and Obituaries have not been put on microfilm for the years 1924 through 1929.

The 1880 Spartanburg Township/Glendale Census listed the household as;

Monroe Burdett 25

Wife; Amanda 24

No children.

<u>The 1900</u> Spartanburg Township /Glendale Census showed they had been married 21 years and were the parent of 8 children, 4 living.

The household was listed as:

Monroe Burdett 45, husband, born March, 1885/ sling maker

Wife; Amanda 44, born September, 1855

Children; Willie V. 18, born January, 1882/weaver C. Maude 16, born March, 1884/spooler

Clara 14, born December, 1885/spooler Marvin M. 3, born November, 1896

Buried in the Glendale Community Cemetery;

Grave markers; A.M. Burdett, March 19, 1855=February 19, 1935

Tallulah Morris Burdett, September 10, 1855=December 13, 1932

Their son; William V. Burdett, January 7, 1882=March 5, 1971

Lilly Burdett, 1884=1920 (unidentified)

The Family of Clara Burdett Warren, daughter of Monroe and Amanda Tallulah Burdett; Clara Burdett married William W. Warren.

They moved to Gaffney. No census records were found.

Obituary records show that Clara Burdett Warren died at the age of 87 in November, 1973. No records on William Warren's status were found.
