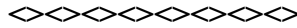


Glendale's Grizzle Families

Census Enumerators listed names and dates as they understood the registrant who oft times had little or no education which led to numerous errors in names, dates and ages. I have tried to copy the census as recorded, where errors occur, I apologize. Death certificates are not available in Spartanburg for years before 1917 and Obituaries have not been put on microfilm for the years 1924 through 1929.



The Family of Joseph and Mary Grizzle, both born in North Carolina.

The 1910 Spartanburg/Glendale Census listed the household as;

Joseph and Mary had been married 30 years and were the parents of 6 children.

Joseph Grizzle 60, husband, battery filler Wife; Mary A. 48

Child; Cleveland 15, spinner

A child named Bub 18, was boarding in [Pacolet](#) at the time.

The 1920 Spartanburg/Glendale Census listed the household as;

Mary Grizzle 58, head of household, widow.

Children; Bub 29, spinner Cleave 25 spinner

Ida Grizzle Pope 30, spinner Husband; Walter Pope 26, auto mechanic

Obituary records show that;

Mary A. Grizzle died at the age of 70 in March, 1931.

No record of Joseph Grizzle's death was found.



Ida Grizzle Pope, daughter of Joseph and Mary Grizzle;

Ida Grizzle married Walter Pope.

1940 Spartanburg/Glendale Census listed the household as;

Ida Pope, 53, head of household/widow

Maggie Harris , lodger

Obituary records show that;

Ida Grizzle Pope died at the age of 89 in March, 1979.

No record of Walter Pope's death but records show that Ida was a widow in 1940.



Bub Grizzle, son of Joseph and Mary Grizzle;

Bub Grizzle married Della Padgett.

No census records found

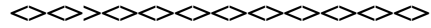
Obituary records show that;

Della Padgett Grizzle died in June, 1935.

Obituary records show that;

Luther Grizzle died at the age of 88 in February, 1991.

Eva Mae Wright Grizzle died at the age of 65 in October, 1980.

Writer's comments; The Grizzle families lived in a group in 5 or 6 houses on their little tract of land some three miles from [Glendale Mills](#) on the Sutton Road. They were quite, honest and hardworking people. Living a distance from the village with no public transportation, except for the mill workers, they did not frequent the community and were not well known.
