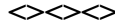


Children; Theodore 34, weaver Nannie 32, cotton mill

Obituary records show that;
Franklin B. Moss of [Glendale](#) died at the age of 71 in October, 1915.
No obituary records of Mary Moss were found.



The Family of Mary E. Moss Bishop, daughter of Franklin B. and Mary Moss.
The 1900 Spartanburg/Campobello Census shows that she and James R. Bishop had been married 7 years and were the parents of 5 children, 4 living.

The household was listed as;
James R. Bishop 28, born April, 1872/lumberman
Wife; Mary E. 27, born March, 1873
Children; Duphie 6, born January, 1894 Furman 3, born March, 1897
 Herman 3, born March, 1897
 Alpha 6 months, born November, 1899

The 1910 Spartanburg/Campobello Census listed the household as;

James R. Bishop 37			Mary 34	
Children; Duphie 16	Herman 12	Furman 12	Alpha 10	
Cynthia 8	Manie 6	Mary 3	Hattie 1	

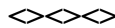
The 1920 Spartanburg/Campobello Census listed the household as;

Mary E. Bishop, 46, widow/heard of household/farmer
Children; Furman 22, garage manager Duphie 26, Nurse
Alpha 20 Maggie 15 Hattie 11 Burney 9
James 6 Frank 3 years, 10 months

The 1930 Spartanburg/Campobello Census listed the household as;

Mary E. Bishop, 57/farmer
Children; Hattie 21, saleslady Burney 19, farmer
 James 16, auto mechanic Frank 14, farmer

Obituary records show that;
Mary E. Moss Bishop of Landrum, S.C., died at the age of 83 in October, 1956.
While I found the obituary of a James Bishop, who died in 1911, due to my health, I could not prove that he was Mary's husband.
